Message Truth:

Were you to honestly evaluate your life would you say that you are making a mess or leaving your mark? What differentiates a Christian from a non-Christian? What are the marks which define authentic Christianity? A Christian is simply one who has asked God for forgiveness and been forgiven. Many people claim to be Christians, but not all who claim the name are truly His. We are identifying ten distinguishing marks of authentic Christian faith. Over the past three weeks we have discussed the first five marks of a genuine work of grace: a Christian loves completely, a Christian will obey consistently, a Christian lives authentically, a Christian confesses continually, and a Christian knows competently. This week we will see that a Christian believes confidently and is fruitful. What indelible marks of your Christianity are visible to those who know you?
